







### Birth to Five Illinois - Bringing Voices from the Library to Reshape Early Learning Systems

Join this session to learn how library workers and patrons can play a valuable role in reshaping early learning systems in Illinois. Libraries often serve as first touchpoints for families with children under the age of 6, but they are rarely thought of as strong contributors to systems of early care and education. Birth to Five Illinois is a new statewide organization focused on elevating the voices of community members, including library workers, through a Council structure to increase equity in early learning and ensure that future funding and legislative decisions made at the State level are well-informed by local input. In this session, you will hear from library workers who currently serve on local Birth to Five Illinois Councils along with the Regional Council Managers for those areas. Panelists will discuss the importance and benefit of library representation in this new statewide initiative.

# Navigating Tragedy: A Library's Response to a Mass Shooting

On July 4th, 2022, Highland Park, Illinois experienced an active shooter situation at the annual 4th of July Parade in the city's downtown area. Seven people were killed and 48 were wounded. Just a few blocks away, the library became a sanctuary for staff and other parade participants. While the library's response was immediate, it continues to evolve as our community needs change. Libraries are integral to communities and in times of tragedy, they are safe havens for their users. When the unthinkable happens, how do you serve your community? What resources can a library provide to help heal a community? At this session, participants will learn our first-hand advice on how to prepare in times of tragedy, how to navigate the sometimes overwhelming amount of support you will receive, and what resources to provide to a grieving community.

### Social-Emotional Connections: Youth Programming and BEYOND!

As schools prioritize incorporating social-emotional learning (SEL) into curriculum, libraries can also take the leap and infuse SEL practices into storytimes, book discussions, and other youth and family programming. But it doesn't have to stop there! Everyday customer service, reference, and readers advisory interactions can also benefit from an SEL lens. This fun and interactive session will look at some ideas for creating social-emotional connections in all your work. A brief introduction about SEL competencies will offer a basic framework that anyone can adapt to their own authentic personality and work style. Deeper topics include talking about feelings and behavior with toddlers and preschoolers in storytime, building collaboration and cooperation into early literacy programs, igniting empathy and self-awareness in book and writing programs, and leading intergenerational and mindful family events. This session will also explore ways to connect with reluctant readers, teen volunteers, and parents and caregivers. Attendees will see how natural it can be to insert SEL practices into their daily lives and will have a chance to participate in some engaging activities, share their own ideas, or just sit back and watch.

# Breaking from Tradition: Leading Staff Through Change to Elevate Youth Services

All too often, youth services departments find themselves set in a routine, recommending the same go-to titles and offering the same programs. ### Ha Ha... Made You Read! : Tricking Teen Patrons into Literacy Skills

Sometimes it feels like pulling teeth when we try to get teen patrons to join the latest book club, or writing camp. Literacy skills are crucial for lifelong learning and success, so it can be so frustrating when teens seem resistant to something so good for them. Much like parents sneaking vegetables into fruit smoothies, librarians can flip the script and design programming that offers fun challenges enriched with literary skills. 




